Letter dated 21 May 1979 to Bob Lloyd:

"I was a member of Primary Class 13 (The Hindenburg class) at Lakehurst...1937. Went through the ranks through AGC and then became, as far as I know the first warrant (before they had warrant Aerographer) so I was a warrant Boatswain. Went to flight school along the way, Pensacola grad 1941 as the second Aerog AP with Willy Gruber being the first. Willy was a chief in '36 so don't know the year he went toPensacola flight school around 1930 I think.

The above is not why I'm writing, but to merely identify myself as I've been retired since 1956 and my career might have been a little before you became too well acquainted. Why I write is to again make the offer either to the NWSA or to the school historian of an 8 X 10 picture I have for copying purposes. I was going through Lakehurst several years ago and stopped by the Aerog school and the Chiefs took me in hand and showed my wife and I a fine time. In passing one of the Chiefs showed me an album containing all the classes except 13. At that time it had slipped my mind and I could not remember a picture of the class being taken. Since then, in my mothers effects I found such a picture. This photo is well preserved and I think should be relatively easy to copy. I offered it before to a

LCDR in Pensacola, who I think was Pres. of the Assn. at the time, but never heard from him. So I now offer it to you if you will send me back the original.

I do not have a list of the students in the picture but remember a goodly number of them and with a list I think I could identify most of them. If not I, then other member of the class could. I understand that Cruse has just been in touch with Ted Tenbrink of our class and I know that there are several others of our class who were career people and who are still alive.

I am in Pensacola on rare occasions, and the next time there I would like very much to see you and take a look at some of the history that you have.
